This programme is arranged especially for students of outstanding character who have demonstrated exceptional music ability. The programme "America's Youth in Concert" sponsored by the Universal Academy For Music, Princeton, New Jersey, is designed to enrich and expand the musical and cultural experience of the students selected for the programme. It is also designed to further develop already recognized talents and provide the students with an opportunity to dramatize to the world the fine quality and high character of American youth.

Following their concert at CARNEGIE HALL this company of outstanding American students of music will perform at John F. Kennedy Center, Washington, D. C., prior to their scheduled concerts in London, Brussels, Paris, Salzburg, Venice, Florence and will conclude with their final concert at the BALSILICA of MASSENZIO at the Roman Forum, Rome, Italy.





The Dream

America's Youth in Concert -- The Realization of a Dream

On June 28, 1971, 500 young men and women from all over America came together for the first time. Their gathering was the beginning of the fulfillment of a dream. The dream, conceived in the mind of Lynn Stewart Geddes, president of the Universal Academy for Music, was that a group of young Americans might be brought together to dramatize to the world the fine quality and high standards of the character of American youth, to motivate and reward dedicated performance by youthful music students, and to provide the participating students an outstanding educational experience. America's Youth in Concert assembled to fulfill that high purposed dream.

On July 6, 1972, 900 more young people answered the call to achieve, to succeed, to dramatize, and to fulfill. When they first came together they were a gathering of individuals, strangers to one another. But they had the common bond of music — the common interest, the common goal, the common dedication to music as an art and a universal language, and to the performance of music as the highest form of human cooperation.

That bond welded them into a unit. Under the direction of some of America's outstanding music educators, Dr. Max F. Dalby, Dr. William Ramsey, Professors James Jorgenson, Vilom Sokol, and Theron Kirk, this rich raw material was molded into a finished form, a musical expression consisting of two concert bands, a symphony orchestra, and two choirs totaling nearly 500 voices. They performed in America and in Europe and achieved the desired result — they proved that American youth justify the high hopes for America and the world that motivated the dreams of Lynn Stewart Geddes, Founder and President of Universal Academy for Music.






through an intensive rehearsal schedule, to the successful completion and enthusiastic acceptance of the first concert, recorded live, at Carnegie Hall.







They went to their nation's capital and saw the beauties of that great city. There they grew in appreciation for the American ideal they had espoused . . .

They wandered through the beautiful, luxurious gardens at Versailles . . . and longed for the beauties of America.






In Paris, the Eiffel Tower dominates and towers over the city's skyline . . .






The Staff



Frank Wirig, Vice President of UAM, had responsibility for the myriad administrative and business details. Mrs. Bessie Wirig was his steady helper.


Academy Staff







Frank Turner, Tour Director— Problems to solve, questions to answer, fears to calm... Before many days into the tour, the tour director became one of the most sought after faces.











Washington, D.C.

The English Channel



"So everybody off the bus and stay off the road." At least you could stretch out a little and it was cooler!


France's Past



Narrow streets, quaint shops, warm, friendly people, and of course, the towering fortress, characterize this favorite city.










Florence




Pompeii

The ruined temples, the crumbling colosseum, the villas, public bath, and the skeletons all provide a bleak reminder of that ancient volcanic disaster.




The stone streets, rutted with the passing of thousands of chariots, still appear as they did after the last chariot raced through them 1900 years ago.


Rome



All roads led to Rome and ended here . . . the Roman Forum, the center of the center of the world.










And the end drew near . . .


